Will Reinvention Bring Redemption?

In addition to electing a new leader, the Patriot party has voted to change their party platform. The alterations struck down their previous pledge to protect teachers and added a commitment to equality, perhaps motivated by Assemblyman Thomas's innovative commitment to promoting equality for all forms of life.

ROCKLIN- Yesterday Buzz reporters sat down with Assemblymembers Cook, Nieuwsma, and Shumate for interviews regarding their experiences in both parties.

All three pointed to an apparent concentration of power as a key reason in their decisions to leave the Patriot party. As Nieuwsma noted, "Able was kinda trying to control the party and be Speaker at the same time... [T]he Constitutionalists were always together. They seemed really confident about

things." As a member of the Constitutionalists, she praises party leader Assemblywoman Dunham for her ability to listen and keep the party unified. She admits that earlier rumors of a possible coup were true, but clarified that the offending Assemblymember had stepped back.

They also cited dislike of the Patriot platform as influential, an issue that may resonate with some current party members. Additionally, they pointed to the Patriot's habit of setting up a succession line

as a possible reason for their fall in popular opinion. Still, regardless of the official titles of party members, Cook surmised that "He [Able] is in control of that party."

Rumors that the three are unhappy with their standing the amongst Constitutionalists were denied. By contrast, the defectors hinted that there may be more **Patriots** joining the majority party, though they asked the Buzz not to print any specific names.
